He exhibited at the Viennese Trade Exhibition in 1845, the Great Exhibition in London in 1851 and the Paris Exposition of 1855 (where he won a second-class medal). He further exhibited at the London Exhibition of 1871 where he was awarded diploma of Honour, and at the 1873 Exhibition in Vienna. He retired in 1881 having handed over the business to his son Julius. **£400-500**
